2023 HIGHLIGHTS

- The Primate Rescue Center, Inc. (PRC) remains a beacon of commitment to the welfare of primates. Our devoted staff, volunteers, and interns continued their tireless efforts to ensure every primate resident receives appropriate, species-specific care tailored to support their individual nutritional, medical, social, and intellectual needs.
- We welcomed a new face this year with the addition of Caregiver Michelle Meeker in June.
 Caregiver Elizabeth Gatlin was promoted to Animal Care Staff Supervisor. All administrative staff (including our Executive Director) perform caregiving duties when needed. Our team has a total of over 63 years of experience caring for primates.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS (continued)

- The sanctuary completed repairs and enriching structural improvements to three primate enclosures this year.
 - After a successful campaign to raise funds for the capuchin monkey's outdoor enclosure improvements, staff members Melanie Parker, Tanner Gatlin and Michael Staples built four new platforms to increase the amount of usable space for the capuchins and offer them expansive areas to eat, groom, rest, and play together.
 - Former intern Lauren Mayer constructed a large hammock for the chimpanzees' outdoor enclosure to add to the ongoing improvements and structural enrichment opportunities for the chimps.
 - We made necessary repairs and renovations to one of the monkey houses to ensure many years of safe housing for its residents.

RESCUE & RELOCATION OF ANIMALS IN NEED

Our unwavering commitment to serving primates in need across the United States remains steadfast, regardless of where their journey to sanctuary begins or ends. While we take in newly rescued animals at our Kentucky facility as space allows, we also offer invaluable assistance with equipment, transportation, and expert staff to ensure the seamless and humane relocation of primates to other sanctuaries.

- We assisted with the relocation of 2 primates rescued from private homes. Both Ted (long-tailed macaque, Lexington KY) and Willie (capuchin monkey, Beth Page TN) spent a month at the PRC where they received specialized care and medical evaluations before PRC staff members Elizabeth and Tanner Gatlin transported them to Wildlife Rescue and Rehabilitation in Texas.
- We ensured 8 additional primates found appropriate refuge through our referrals to and collaboration with partner sanctuaries.





NOTABLE ANIMAL CARE PROGRAM EVENTS (continued)

With the goal of lifetime, individualized care at the forefront of our promise to each primate who lives at the PRC, we continue to assess and adapt each resident's care plan with several variables in mind. In planning care for an individual we consider species-specific needs in regard to nutrition and enclosure variety, factors such as age, general physical health, medical issues, and social and emotional health. This individualized process has proven to extend the length of life for the majority of our residents, and ensures we meet them where they are and provide them with the best care each day. The majority of our residents are currently in their senior stage of life, making their care plans even more complex. To meet their needs we make modifications to accommodate for physical abilities or the addition of new health care challenges. We are immensely proud of the work we do at the PRC and the continued success of our individualized primate care plans, as well as the resiliency we see in our primate residents. We will continue our specialized approach to primate care and always strive to be proactive in our promise of lifetime care.



NOTABLE ANIMAL CARE PROGRAM EVENTS (continued)

Our caregiving team continues to advance our operant conditioning training program. We focus on cultivating positive and safe husbandry and veterinary care behaviors in our animals. For example, we have been working with diabetic chimpanzee, Noelle, on training to allow daily blood glucose monitoring. This method of training, emphasizing positive reinforcement, has led to significant improvements in animal care, especially among primates previously hesitant to cooperate. We will continue these efforts to maintain a calm, stress-free experience for the primates' health assessments and daily care.

PUBLIC EDUCATION, OUTREACH & EVENTS

Over the past year, the PRC has worked diligently to share our mission with the local community and beyond. We've hosted events at the sanctuary, conducted educational presentations and interviews with various media programs, schools, and businesses on-site, off-site and online, and continued to expand our organization's website and Primate Pal Program. In addition, our outreach programs are designed to encourage compassion for all species, especially in children and young adults, to raise awareness about the accomplishments and needs of the sanctuary and to teach about primate behavior, exploitation, and rehabilitation.

PUBLIC EDUCATION, OUTREACH & EVENTS (continued)

On-Site Events

- We were thrilled to host PRC Members on-site at our 2023 Member Event in June, allowing nearly 400 members and guests to learn more about the history of the sanctuary, our current residents, and our day-to-day Animal Care Program.
- We expanded our On-Site Volunteer Program through our new Enrichment Workshop. Both the staff from The American Board of Family Medicine and members of Christ Church Cathedral participated in on-site Enrichment Workshops, where they enjoyed an educational tour of the sanctuary and made enrichment for the primates. We are so proud to have initiated this new branch of the Volunteer Program and look forward to providing many more unique volunteering experiences to members of our community.

Off-Site Events and Education

- PRC was once again the benefitting charity for the Run through the Vineyard Bourbon and Wine 5K, hosted by 1922 House Winery and Vineyards, Happy Hour Liquors, and RaceRise.
- We continue to participate in learning workshops and lectures at educational institutions, local businesses and online forums for humans of all ages, including the University of Kentucky Volunteer Nonprofit Fair, Red Oak Elementary Career Day, Scott County Library's Teen Night, and the Lexington Rotary Club.

Outreach, Fundraisers and Media

- With the help of social media, newsletters, and our website, the Primate Pal Program has continued to show growth each year. With a **total of 269 Primate Pals**, donors were able to help us directly support the care of primates living at the PRC.
- Our email and print newsletters inform readers about happenings at the sanctuary, as well as an array of primate-related issues, including the prohibitions on pet ownership, ape and monkey social behavior, and ongoing legislation concerning primates.
- Our social media pages engage over 16,400 followers on Facebook, Instagram, Twitter and YouTube. This represents an increase of 3.1% followers since 2022.
- We participated in several online giving events throughout the year, including Kentucky Gives
 Day, Giving Day for Apes, Giving Tuesday, the Bluegrass Community Foundation Good Giving
 Challenge and Facebook fundraisers to support the direct care of the primates living at the
 sanctuary. We also celebrated and promoted World Chimpanzee Day, Animal Sanctuary Caregiver
 Day, and National Volunteer Week with followers, donors and the primate sanctuary community.
- We increased public awareness of the exotic animal trade and the sanctuary's mission through interviews with local news affiliates and partnerships with local businesses.
- We continued our Business Sponsorship Program to increase awareness in the community, encourage a reliable source of funding, and attract new supporters of the PRC's mission. In 2023, our business sponsors included Pet Wants Lexington, Great Lakes Equine Massage Therapy, Mark Rush Photography, and Joker Web Hosting.















VOLUNTEER AND INTERN PROGRAMS

- The PRC's Volunteer Program including On-Site, Off-Site, and Event Volunteers, has regained momentum and added new members to the team after the temporary hiatus due to Covid-19 in 2020. Our 2023 roster included 20 on-site volunteers, 1 off-site volunteer, and 21 event volunteers for a total of 42 individuals. Overall, volunteers worked a total of 2,460 hours in 2023.
- Our Internship Program immerses students in the daily operation of a primate sanctuary. Interns learn about primate husbandry, nutrition requirements, veterinary care, and enrichment needs of primates as well as about safety standards and practices. Our long-term intern (June 2022-January 2023) contributed 1,152 hours of service.

- Former PRC caregiver Jennifer Brejcha (Michigan), lived onsite for 10 weeks, volunteering 40 hours a week as an Animal Care Volunteer and Event Volunteer during our Annual Member Event. Jennifer brought a great deal of experience and we appreciated learning about her past experiences and hearing her perspective on how the sanctuary and its residents have evolved over the years. Jennifer is an incredibly kind, thoughtful, and hardworking volunteer, and she will always be welcome here.
